Streetwise works nationally with Jewish schools and Community organisation, enhancing the personal safety and personal development of young Jewish people to support their physical and emotional wellbeing. Primary Leadership Programme

This session is intended for new Year 6 classes

This session can take place during Term 1.

With Year 6 comes new responsibility and this session is designed to help Year 6 understand what is means to be a leader and role model.

Anti-Bullying - November

Streetwise delivers Anti-Bullying sessions for young people in Reception to Year 6, as well as offering KS1 & KS2 assemblies.

With Anti Bullying Week taking place 14th – 18th November, Streetwise will be running its Anti Bullying Programmes throughout the month of November (but not exclusively). Streetwise is a core member of the Anti-Bullying Alliance.

The aims of this programme are:



- To define bullying
- For pupils to understand what bullying is and to recognise the different forms it may take
- To look at our own behaviour in relation to bullying
- How to respond to bullying

Online Safety - February

Streetwise delivers Internet Safety sessions for young people in Reception to Year 6, as well as offering KS1 & KS2 assemblies, Teacher training and Parent evening sessions.

With Safer Internet Day taking place on 14th February, Streetwise will be running its Internet Safety Programmes throughout the month of February (but not exclusively). Streetwise have been trained by the Child Exploitation and Online Protection Centre (CEOP) and we work towards educating young people about the potential risks online.



The aims of this programme are for pupils:

• To feel confident using the internet in a fun, safe way



- To understand the benefits and risks of using technology to communicate
- To understand what personal information is, and when and where it is appropriate to give out personal details online
- To know what to do if they have trouble online

Body Image and Self-Esteem in May

Following requests from a number of schools, this programme is for all year groups to address body image and self-esteem. The aims of this programme are for pupils:

- To understand what body image is and how this may influence our self-esteem
- To place importance on who people are and their inner characteristics rather than what they look like
- To encourage young people to use inclusive and kind language to describe themselves and others

Relationships Education in the Summer Term Reception- Year 3

This new offering is in addition to the work we do with KS2 on Relationships and Sex Education.

Streetwise Relationships Education programmes are run throughout the year. These sessions were created to enhance young people's ability to recognise and talk about familial relationships, friendships and to understand diversity.



- Be confident in understanding and communicating their feelings about friendships and relationships
- Understand and respect different types of relationships, including friendships and family relationships
- Understand the characteristics of healthy relationships
- Develop positive values and a moral framework that will guide their decisions and judgements



- Be able to develop a positive body image and know how to raise their self-esteem
- Be prepared for the emotional and physical changes during puberty

To summarise, at primary level, children would learn about subjects including:

• Families and people who care for me — Including: the importance of families for children growing up; characteristics of healthy family life; varieties in family life, and how to recognise if family relationships are making them feel unhappy or unsafe; and how to seek help or advice from others if needed

• Caring friendships — including: the importance and characteristics of friendships; and how to recognise who to trust and who not to trust

• Respectful relationships — including: the importance of respecting others and of self-respect; about different types of bullying (including cyberbullying); and the importance of permission-seeking and giving in relationships with friends, peers and adults.

RSE Puberty & Reproduction - Years 4-6

Streetwise offers a Puberty & Reproduction Parent information session outlining what is delivered to young people.

Streetwise Relationships and Sex Education programmes are run throughout the year. We work closely with the schools to create a lesson plan that is suitable for the Jewish Ethos of the school and with prior approval of the Jewish Studies department. Reproduction will <u>only</u> be taught in Year 6.



Aims:

• To explore the theme of change at puberty with focus on the life cycle including: reproduction; physical maturation and emotional changes during adolescence



- To understand about menstruation and how to manage it
- To explore emotional changes focusing on managing mood swings, expressing feelings and building self-esteem
- To identify safe sources of information and support networks

1.2 Sex and Relationship Education Guidance *Primary Schools*

1.12 - The Department recommends that all primary schools should have a sex and relationship education programme tailored to the age and the physical and emotional maturity of the children. It should ensure that both boys and girls know about puberty and how a baby is born – as set out in Key Stages 1 and 2 of the National Science Curriculum. Section 3 gives further information on what should be taught at these stages and how this should be rooted in the PSHE framework.

1.13 All children, including those who develop earlier than the average, need to know about puberty before they experience the onset of physical changes. In the early primary school years, education about relationships needs to focus on friendship, bullying and the building of self-esteem. [...]

New Beginnings - Year 6 June/July

Alongside the Year 6 programme, Streetwise can deliver New Beginnings School Parent evening sessions.

In preparation for Year 6's move to secondary school, Streetwise delivers its New Beginnings, formerly known as Transition to Secondary School Programme throughout June and July. This programme incorporates both personal safety and personal development activities.

The aims of this programme are:



- To express what concerns and excites young people about moving to secondary school
- For pupils to identify potential difficult situations and look for solutions to overcome them



- To normalise concerns and elaborate on what is exciting about moving to secondary
- To develop street awareness in regards to moving to Secondary School (eg. safe use of public transport)

Antisemitism Assembly

This assembly is on offer to Year 3-6 and lasts 40 minutes.
